

Saša Nedeljković is a full professor at the Department of Ethnology and Anthropology at the Faculty of Philosophy in Belgrade. His primary fields of scientific interest are identity problems, ethnicity, nationalism, religion, legends, rural culture, violence, minorities, migration, old age, catering. He is the recipient of a scholarship for guest lecturers CEEPUS - WUS Austria Foundation in 2001, and a JFDP scholarship of the American Council for Education in 2011 for training in the USA. He published a large number of books, monographs and scientific papers in domestic and foreign scientific journals. He edited several collections of papers. He participated in a large number of international scientific conferences in Serbia and abroad. In 2001, he was a visiting lecturer at the Institute of Southeast European History at the University of Graz, and in 2011, he was a visiting professor at the University of Pittsburgh (Pennsylvania, USA) and the University of Illinois (USA). As a guest lecturer, he gave lectures in 2010 at the University of Primorska in Koper (Slovenia). In the period 2012-2015, he was the editor-in-chief of the scientific journal *Religion and spirituality in society*, published by Common Ground Research Networks from Champaign, Illinois (USA). He was the manager of several national scientific research projects (*Contemporary culture of Serbs in Kosovo and Metohija*, and *Research; and Recording of elements of the intangible culture of Bosniaks in the area of southwestern Serbia*) and was a partner in several international scientific projects (*Ambiguous Identities and Nation-state Building in Southeastern Europe*, led by the Open University in Berlin, funded by the Volkswagen Stiftung, 2006-2009; and *Transforming Anxieties of Aging in Southeastern Europe. Political, Social, and Cultural Narratives of Demographic Change*, led by the Leibniz Institute for East and Southeast European Studies, funded by the Volkswagen Stiftung, 2023-2027). At undergraduate studies, he teaches *Anthropology of Ethnicity* and *Culture and Violence*, at master's studies *Anthropology of Esotericism* and *Cultural Aspects of Human Resources*, and at doctoral studies *Anthropology of Violence and Crime*. He conducted field research in Serbia, Romania, Austria, and the USA. He is the head of the Department of Ethnology and Anthropology (2025 - ) and the head of the Center for Research on Violence and Crime at the Faculty of Philosophy in Belgrade. He was a member of the InASEA Executive Committee (2011-2016) and the SIEF Committee on Folk Religion (1999-2003).
